Greeting Legionnaires of the 22nd District. I would like to highlight today's Historian Report on Post 521. The Edward H White II American Legion Post 521 is located at 2221 Preston Avenue in Pasadena TX, 77503. The post was founded in 1967 and is named after Edward H White II.

He was born on November 14, 1930 in San Antonio, Texas and named after his father who also served in the military and eventually retired as a high-ranking officer. The younger White attended West Point and eventually started his career in the US Air Force and later serving as a NASA Astronaut. On February 21, 1967, White tragically passes away from a launch test gone wrong in Florida. He dies at the age of 36.

Next year Post 521 will celebrate their 60th anniversary of serving veterans, families and the community of Pasadena. Whether natural disasters of hurricanes and storms or disasters of nearby refineries, Post 521 is always prepared for challenges. The past few years they have prepared cooked turkeys to give away to the community during the holidays.

Post 521 is known for displaying a restored F4D Phantom Jet in its front courtyard. It has been said that this Vietnam era plane symbolizes perseverance. This is also a reflection of Post 521 in Pasadena, Texas.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT
22ND DISTRICT CONVENTION

APRIL 11, 2026

Commander Harvey and members of the 22nd District, the District Adjutant and Department of Texas Membership Chair and I have worked very hard to provide the Posts of the 22nd District with all of the information for them to have a very successful membership year. But it appears that not everyone has the same enthusiasm for membership as we do. If we do not continue to grow this Great Organization of ours it will not exist in the future. As we all know the Post Vice Commander is responsible for membership at the Post level. It is the Post Commanders responsibility to ensure that his Post is meeting the membership goals set forth by the Department Commander for the year. The Post Commander is ultimately responsible for what gets done or not by his Post Officers. Some of your Post Commanders have not been working towards the membership goals as they have fallen short and continue to not meet the goals.

Here is where the Posts in the District are as of Friday April 10th:

Post 52 101.61% need 10 to make 90% retention

Post 77 96.88% need 7 to make 100% goal, they have met the 90% retention

Post 164 103.41% they have met the 90% retention and should be competing for the Post Excellence award

Post 319 83.61% need 10 to make 100% and 6 to meet the 90% retention.

Post 391 65% need 7 to make 100% and 5 to make 90% retention. They also have not recruited a new member or completed a transfer yet this year.

Post 416 101.79% They have met the 90% retention. The Post has not completed at transfer yet this year.

Post 472 103.83% They have met the 90% retention and should be competing for the Post Excellence Award.

Post 490 99.42% need 6 more to make 100%, they have met the 90% retention

Post 521 82.06% need 40 to make 100% and 29 to make 90% retention.

Post 596 100.00% They have met the 90% retention. They have not completed a transfer this year.

Post 654 85.92% need 29 to make 100% and 30 to make 90% retention

Commander Harvey there is a communication issue within the District. I have asked on multiple occasions for the Post who are not meeting the goals to let me know what issues they are having. I am getting no responses from those Posts. I am sure the reports that are being sent out are not being read at the Post level. We just had a communication class today I hope that this will help that situation.

Your District so far this year has 201 new members and 26 transfers. The 201 new members are 3rd best in the Department of Texas. The number of transfers is very low. All of the Post have been given Post 345 rosters to use to get these members into an active Post they are just not working those rosters.

At the beginning of the membership year, I asked all of the Posts to form a membership committee. The Posts that are doing well have done that. The Post who are not doing well probably have not done this.

The District is at less than 3% of Market Penetration and we should be at 5%. There are about 85,000 veterans in Harris county. We need to find a way to attract them to the American Legion.


Oratorical

Community Service Report

Post 77 has been active in the community as you have heard from the Post 77 report that was read earlier at our convention. I left off 3 programs that Post 77 works with to ensure that our reach into the community goes to special causes and touches the lives and hearts of the community.

Southeastern Guide Dogs is a program that Legionnaire Bob Rone introduced to the post and this program takes small puppies and takes them through a rigorous program to prepare them to be guide dogs for the blind. Some of the dogs that fail the program to become guide dogs, will then become dogs for veterans who suffer from PTSD. Every year Post 77 donates about \$1,000.00 to this program and every year we get a report on the status of the dog and a report of who and where the dog was placed for service.

The CRRC program is the Community Resource and Referral Centers (CRRCC and they are located inside the loop at 1700 Webster Street, Houston TX 77003. This program and their building provide veterans a place to take a shower and clean up, check their emails and looks into assistance to provide help in their lives. About 3 years ago this program opened its doors and Legionnaire Jimmy Mitchell has worked with the staff. Just recently Post 77 donated \$1,000.00 in gift cards to assist the program.

Post 77 provides support to the Houston Military Affairs Committee, this year Post 77 donated about \$2200.00 to the organization. This helps HMAAC to have their annual Ball/Gala and enables Post 77 to purchase a table for members of Post 77 to attend.

Post 77 recognizes that it cannot be at every event in the communities, but it also recognizes that if we can't be there, then sometimes we can support the events through a monetary donation.

Post 319 Community Report

This past year, Cortez/Norris American Legion Post 319 observed Memorial Day at Grandview Cemetery, placing flags at the graves of over 300 veterans. We celebrated Flag Day at Dow Park in Deer Park with a fundraiser by Kicker Insures Me, supplied meals to our first responders in Deer Park and La Porte on the Fourth of July. We also provided support to the Pasadena Livestock Show and Rodeo parade, as both coordinators and judges. Members of the Post supported and handed out over 300 Halloween coloring books and crayons at the Deer Park trunk or treat. In early December, our membership provided over 300 Teddy Bears to first responders in both communities. Later that month, we remembered our fallen comrades at the Wreaths Across America event at Grandview Cemetery. We were also able to supply Christmas meals to 30 families within the two communities. In the coming weeks, we will present the school awards to all 6 Jr. Highs and both districts and JROTC awards to three schools.

WASHINGTON (AP) — In New York City, two men who federal authorities say were [inspired by the Islamic State](#) brought powerful homemade bombs to a far-right protest outside the mayoral mansion.

In Michigan, [a naturalized citizen from Lebanon](#) rammed his vehicle into a synagogue, where he was shot at by security before he shot himself to death.

In Virginia, [a man previously imprisoned on a terrorism conviction](#) was heard yelling “Allahu akbar” before opening fire in a university classroom in an attack that officials said ended when the shooter was killed by students.

The three acts of violence in the last week have laid bare a heightened terrorism threat unfolding against the backdrop of the U.S. war with Iran and as the country’s counterterrorism system is strained by the [departures of experienced national security professionals](#) at the FBI and Justice Department. [The firings and resignations](#), along with the diversion of resources and personnel over the last year to meet other Trump administration priorities, have fueled concerns about the capability to head off a potential surge in threats.

“So much experience has been decimated from the ranks,” said Frank Montoya, a retired senior FBI official. “The folks that were best positioned to get to the bottom of it before something really bad happened” are in many cases no longer with the government, he said, meaning less experienced personnel assigned to the threat are “starting from way behind.”

The FBI said it would not comment on personnel numbers and decisions, but issued a statement saying “agents and staff are dedicated professionals working around the clock to defend the homeland and crush violent crime. The FBI continuously assesses and realigns our resources to ensure the safety of the American people.”

Iran has a history of plotting attacks, targeted killings inside the US

Iran has vowed revenge for the killing by the U.S. and Israel of Supreme Leader [Ayatollah Ali Khamenei](#), and though the fighting has so far been confined to the Middle East, the Islamic Republic has long professed its determination to carry out violence on American soil.

Iranian operatives, for instance, responded to the 2020 assassination of [Gen. Qassem Soleimani](#) during the first Trump administration with a disrupted murder-for-hire plot targeting [former national security adviser John Bolton](#).

A Pakistani business owner who says he was carrying out instructions from a contact in Iran's [paramilitary Revolutionary Guard](#) was convicted in New York last week of trying to hire hit men in 2024 for assassination plots targeting public figures, including President Donald Trump, who was then running for president.

Though much attention has focused on Iran's use of proxies or hired hands to carry out plots, the country's capability to organize a large-scale assault on the U.S. remains unclear despite clear angst over the potential. The FBI warned in a recent bulletin to law enforcement about Iran's aspiration to conduct a drone attack targeting California, but after the warning was publicized, officials emphasized the intelligence was unverified and that no specific plot was known to exist.

Lone actors have been a persistent concern for the FBI

The U.S. government after the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks overhauled its intelligence and national security apparatus to prevent similarly catastrophic events. But in the years since, lone actors radicalized online have nonetheless carried out shootings like the [2015 ambush attacks at a pair of military sites](#) in Chattanooga, Tennessee and a rampage at an Orlando nightclub the following year by a [gunman who killed 49 people](#) and raged against the "filthy ways of the west."

Those plots by self-directed individuals have proved notoriously difficult to prevent and have occurred even when the FBI has not been roiled by firings and internal upheaval like during the first year of the Trump administration.

“They’re self-directed,” said retired FBI official Edward Herbst. “That’s what makes them really lethal. You never know when they’re going to rise up. You never know when and where they’re going to attack.”

Terrorism concerns typically rise during times of international conflict when military action overseas is accompanied by increased vigilance, including outreach from agents to their sources, more active sharing of tips between federal and local law enforcement and closer coordination among FBI joint terrorism task forces, said Claire Moravec, a former FBI national security official who served as deputy homeland security adviser in Illinois.

Officials have said there is no indication that either the men arrested in connection with the explosives in New York, or the man responsible for Thursday’s Old Dominion University shooting, were motivated explicitly by the Iran war. The man who crashed into Temple Israel synagogue near Detroit on Thursday lost four family members in an Israeli airstrike in his native Lebanon last week, an official in Lebanon said.

Regardless, wars like the one in Iran can function as “accelerants,” raising the volume and intensity of grievances for the disaffected, Moravec said.

“Ultimately, the goal during these periods is not ‘surveillance’ but maintaining a broad awareness of how international events could translate into domestic security risks, so that threats can be identified and disrupted early,” she said in an email.

Resignations, firings at the FBI and Justice Department

The Justice Department’s National Security Division was established in 2006 to address threats of terrorism, espionage and other concerns. In the last year, lawyers in the division found themselves assigned to review the Jeffrey Epstein files to prepare them for release, and elite sections dedicated to prosecuting terrorists and catching spies have endured turnover.

About half of the division’s counterterrorism prosecutors have left since the beginning of the Trump administration, along with about a third of its senior leadership, according to estimates from Justice Connection, a network of department alumni.

A Justice Department spokesperson said the division's singular focus remains "keeping the American people safe from threats foreign and domestic" and that there are no known or credible threats to the homeland.

FBI Director Kash Patel has fired dozens of agents, [most recently about a dozen employees](#) who worked on the counterintelligence investigation into Trump's retention of classified documents at his Mar-a-Lago estate in Florida.

"This is not an exaggeration to say that they are not as capable as they were a year and a half ago," Matthew Olsen, who led the National Security Division during the Biden administration, said this week on the Lawfare podcast, adding that "they've lost, forced out, fired, the most capable, the most experienced FBI agents, FBI officials and DOJ prosecutors, that were working on the Iran threat."

In the national security realm, where experience and source development are vital, the loss of institutional knowledge and community relationships can be a crushing blow, said Montoya, the former FBI official.

"There was no transition," Montoya said of the agents who have been abruptly fired. "These guys were just walked out of the building. The new guys can call them and say, 'Hey, can you tell me what you were doing?'" but even so, "you're still introducing a brand new face into the equation."

Greeting Legionnaires of the 22nd District. The Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) back on July 9, 2025 accounted for US Army Cpl. Lonnie Fields, age 19, who was killed during the Korean War. On September 1950 as a member of Company I, 3rd Battalion, 9th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division was reported missing in the vicinity of the Naktong River in near Yongsan, South Korea after intense fighting in the area. Due to the heavy firefight his body was not able to be recovered. Fast forward 76 years later, Cpl. Fields remains were received and interred at the Houston National Cemetery on March 18th, 2026. I was privileged to attend the fallen veteran's funeral and surviving family members attended and spoke of Cpl. Fields. One relative spoke about how Cpl. Fields was underage when he enlisted in the military and asked his mother to sign his entry form into the military. Upon learning of her son's status in the Korean War, it is said that that the mother grieved and sometimes regretted signing his enlistment papers. Just a painful reminder of the tragedies of war. The Fields are from Houston's Third Ward.

I would like to remind everyone from the 22nd District that you are invited to attend next month's Memorial Day Ceremony being held at the Houston National Cemetery on May 25th, 2026. I would like the many faces of the 22nd District in attendance. This is one of the two days out of the year when we honor and celebrate our veterans and servicemen, the other being Veterans Day. Memorial Day is a great way to remember those veterans, whether they died in combat or lived a full after their military service it's a great way to remember them.
